- Work with the community to make sure they are invested in the project and that it's sustainable
- Hold seminars and speeches about sanitation
- Give small loans to individual and communities, so it's not just based on charity

- Translate books so children can read in their native tongue
- Provide children a safe place to learn
- Enable girls to enroll and stay in school
- Work with existing schools to help them improve their space
- Start projects on small scales to make sure they work and then grow them if they are successful

- Teach children living in poverty about how to earn and save money
- Develop employment opportunities for youth in poverty so the funding is sustainable
- Partner with other organizations to make sure everyone is practicing the best standards in protecting children

- Combine disease intervention with basic health and social services
- Provide health care and education for those who otherwise could not afford it
- Work with community partners to improve access to food, shelter, water, sanitation, education and economic opportunities
- Assist local leaders in improving the existing public health systems
- Seek to prevent diseases rather than just treat them

Why Dreams for Kids chose Kiva

WHAT THEY DO:

- Provide small loans to entrepreneurs (people who want to start a business) to get them out of poverty (this is called microfinancing)
 - Have a repayment rate of 98.37% because of close monitoring and partnership
 - Give women a way to take care of themselves and their families without having to rely on charity
 - Promote the dignity, capability, and accountability of all people
 - 82.43% of loans are given to women

Why Dreams for Kids chose mothers2mothers

WHAT THEY DO:

- Aim to reduce the number of babies born with HIV and help access medical care for themselves and their families
- Use education and empowerment to prevent mother to child transmission of HIV
- Combat stigma within families and communities about HIV
- Train HIV positive mothers to mentor and support other HIV positive mothers
- Build of a community of support, healing, and self-worth

Why Dreams for Kids chose One Acre Fund

WHAT THEY DO:

- Provide tools, training, and market access for farmers living in poverty to grow successful crops
- Empower people living in poverty and hold them accountable rather than charity
- Bring local groups of farmers (mostly made of women) together to collaborate and learn
- Teach farmers the most successful techniques
- Provide environmentally sensitive planting materials and fertilizers
